Purpose

PTE Core tests **general English** through tasks related to everyday life and workplace scenarios to be used to support immigration decisions in Canada.

PTE Academic tests **academic English** with tasks related to study and professional skill to be used to support higher education and skilled migration decisions worldwide.

Skills

Assesses four skills: listening, reading, speaking, writing
Designed to align to the **Canadian Language Benchmarks**

Assesses four skills: listening, reading, speaking, writing
Designed to align to the **Common European Framework of Reference**

Test Content

General content relevant to everyday life, workplaces and some study situations (non-academic). Content covers subjects that would be familiar to everyone.

Authentic source content such as videos/podcasts on the internet, announcements, automated telephone helplines, work meetings, and broadcasts.

Academic content relevant to study and professional situations such as university lectures, interviews, and academic articles.

Authentic source content such as reading and audio texts from books and articles covering broad topics such as social sciences, humanities, business, technology, and health & medicine.

PTE Core Alignment to Canadian Language Benchmark (CLB)

Do the CLB levels assigned by PTE Core genuinely reflect what Canadian experts recognise as CLB-level performance?

Initial Standard Setting (2021)

- To identify score thresholds that correspond to CLB levels 3–10, based on expert evaluation of field-test responses.
- 14 independent judges with extensive experience in teaching and assessing English language, strong familiarity with the CLB.
- Majority had over 15 years experience in language learning and assessment in Canada.
- An item-centred modified Angoff method was used for receptive skills.
- A test-taker modified Analytic judgement method was used for productive skills.

Are we measuring the right kind of English for Canadian migration?

Independent researchers examined tasks, skills, and scoring criteria in PTE Core and compared them with CELPIP General.

Results indicate that PTE Core effectively evaluates overall English proficiency, with tasks that reflect real-life communication.



Concordance with CELPIP



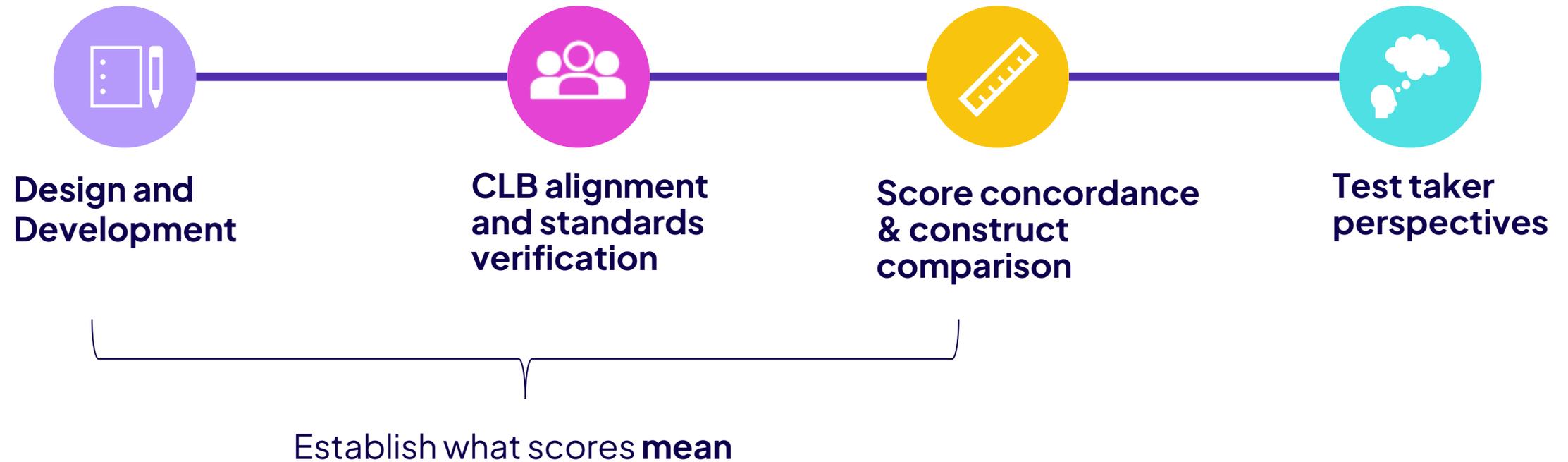
Do different accepted tests lead to comparable outcomes in practice?

Test taker perspectives

Alignment with policy standards is a critical foundation for test validity, it is only **one part of a bigger picture**.

The degree to which test takers perceive the test as **relevant, appropriate, and representative of real-world language use** or the skills it claims to assess.

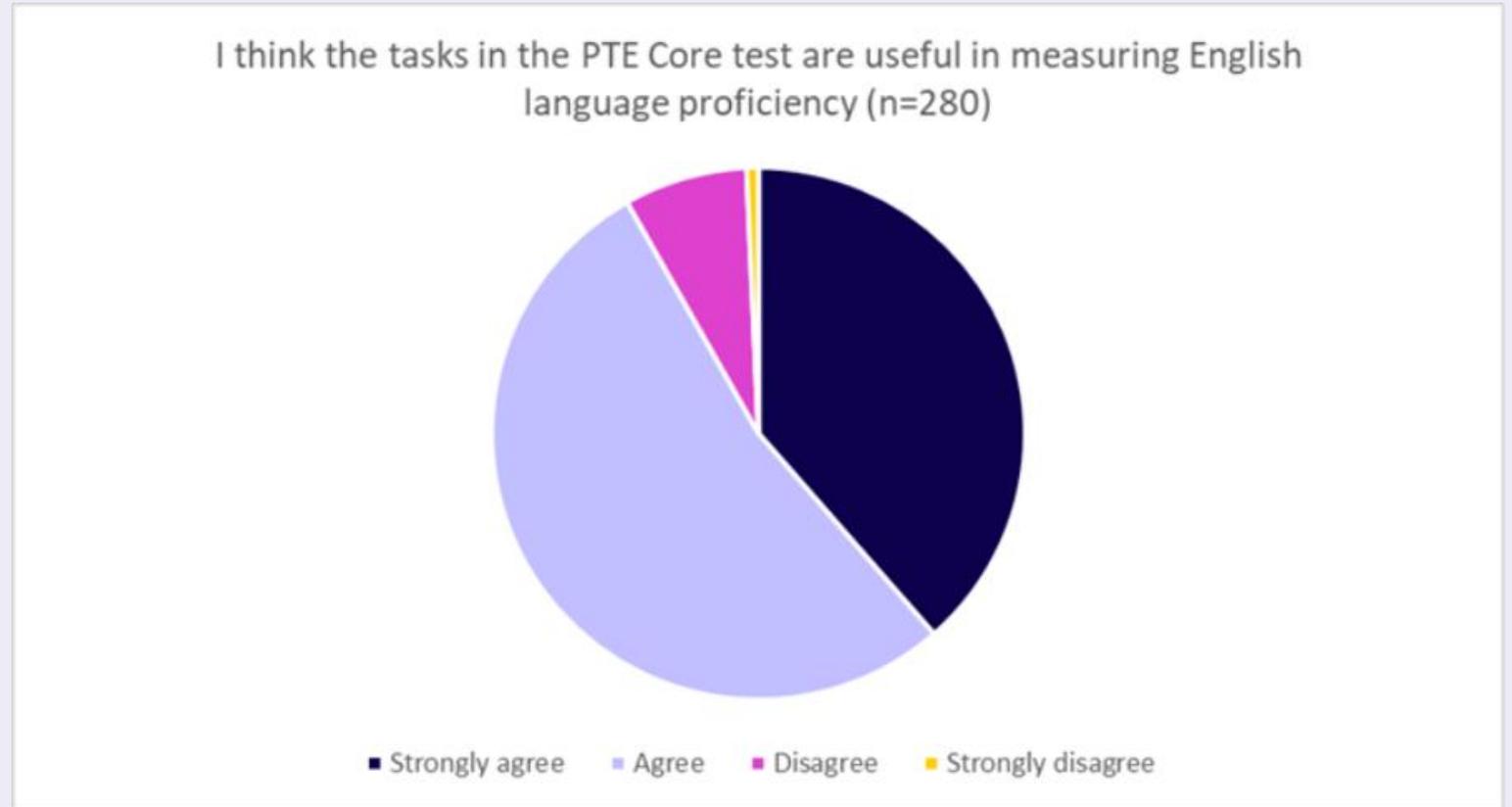
Key Themes that emerged from analysis:

- Contextual insights into test taker experiences and personal language learning journeys

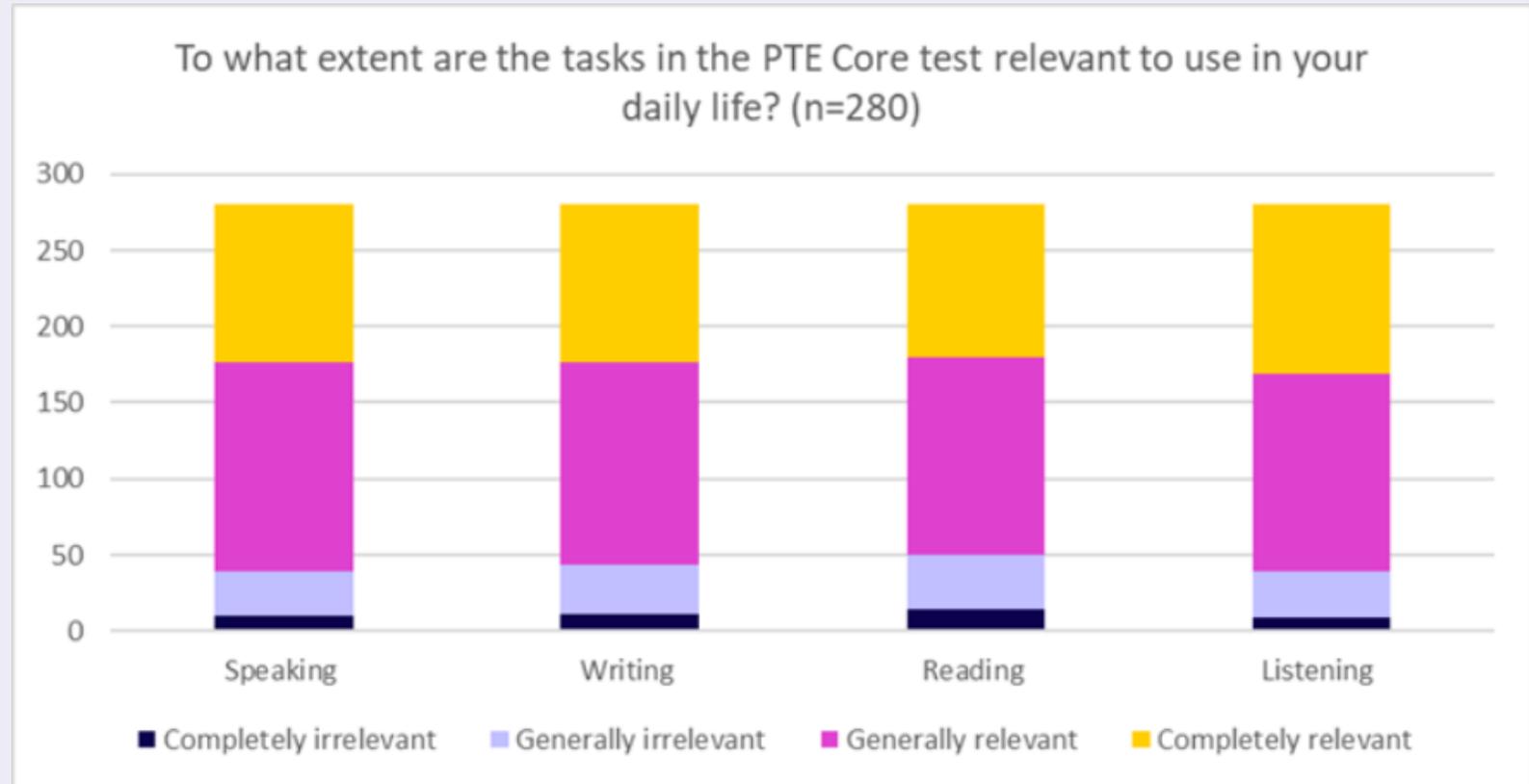
Feedback on Test Experience



92% of survey respondents agree/strongly agree that the tasks in PTE Core are useful in measuring English language proficiency.



85% of all survey participants said that they were either generally relevant or very relevant to use in daily life.



Respond to a Situation

Write Email



Every day we want to organise a daily time for the training of our kids, organising the private lessons for them... **It really happen[s] every day.** (TT4 Interview)

I was going to [the] airport. **Suddenly I got a message that the flight got cancelled. So I want to explain to the driver that I want to go back to my home.** So I told him that please go back to my home. I'll pay you the extra money. Please kindly change the route because I got a message that flight has been cancelled. (TT6 Interview)

I have to do like tens, if not hundreds of emails, like, every single day... this is again **aligning with... the skills, what is used in the day to day life.** (TT7 Interview)

I think it's really important to know how to write. And in the email, it's a daily life situation. You can do both in your personal life and your professional life **to like book a trip or to write an email to your director.** (TT8 Interview)



Contextual Insights

Integration Challenges

- Focus groups with 10 LINC students at College in Toronto area.
- Spoke of the difficulties they experienced in cultural, social and professional contexts.



My neighbour wants to help me to improve my English. So when they have a barbecue party they asked me to take part in. But you know, they speak so fast and [there are] **a lot of local joke when sometimes all of them laugh at something, but I don't know what happened.**

[It's] challenging because [its a] **different culture** and the brand new here and just **my friends are almost all Chinese.**

I have to try to find a job. I used to work in China. I do some marketing communication. But in Canada... **It's impossible for me to find a job because I don't know the English culture**, local culture, and especially for marketing job, the English language, how to use the vocabulary. How to use the sentence to influence your customer. It's really very hard even for local people.

[I want to be a] member of here, **not the just the immigrant**



Understanding Context = Understanding Impact

- Comparative analysis of PTE Academic and PTE Core test taker survey data showed that **PTE Core test takers consistently reported lower levels of confidence** in completing **digital tasks** than PTE Academic test takers.
- By recognising these differences and challenges, we can **reduce unintended obstacles** and support more inclusive and fair assessment results.
- Different tests serve different purposes: understanding context is an important part of understanding impact.

Purpose of the test versus use of the test

We monitor how the test operates in the real-world to ensure that the evidence we have supports the way test scores are being used in practice.

- Are the people taking the test the **expected cohort**?
- Is the test being used for the **intended decisions**?
- Are the decisions linked to the **intended standards**?
- How does the test influence English language learning (**washback**)?
- How does success on the test relate to **meaningful outcomes** in integration, employment, and confidence?

These questions guide our ongoing validation research agenda, alongside continuous monitoring to ensure results are accurate, fair, and reliable.

Conclusions

- PTE Core is underpinned by robust validation evidence
- These evidence types address different questions and work together to establish score meaning
- **BUT** Technical evidence is not the whole story- high-stakes scores affect real people.
- Engaging stakeholders in the research & development is not just a box to tick – it is a vital part of ensuring language tests actually serve the people they impact.
